- 1. CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Craig George calls the meeting to order at approximately 7:00 p.m.

2. CONSENT AGENDA:

ACTION: Bailey makes a motion; Berg seconds the motion, and the motion carries unanimously approving the Consent Agenda as presented:

3. SPECIAL GUESTS/PUBLIC COMMENT

ACTION: Michael Smith, Dayton Historic Preservation Commission Chairman, summarizes the importance and history of Dr. Marcel & Mrs. Mary Pietryzcki's contributions to Dayton and the City Park. He reports that the Commission recommends replacing the existing park sign with a sign that includes the Pietryzcki name and phonetic spelling of his last name at no cost to the City. In addition, the Commission will work towards adding a monument to the Park in the Dr. & Mrs. Marcel Pietryzcki's honor. Broughton reports that the City Park Board supports the Commission's recommendation. Bailey asks if the Commission is requesting that the City to financially support the construction of the new sign. Smith responds no. Weatherford asks if the sign will be brought before Council for approval prior to its construction. Smith states yes, the Commission will present the sign for Council's approval prior to its construction. Smith also reports that the Commission will seek assistance from the Dayton School District for the construction of the sign. Broughton makes a motion; Paris seconds the motion accepting the Dayton Historic Preservation Commission's recommendation to replace the existing park sign with a Dayton City Park sign that includes the Pietryzcki name and phonetic spelling of his last name. There is no further discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

ACTION: Mayor George closes the regular meeting and opens the public hearing at 7:11 p.m. to receive public input on the City of Dayton 2018 -2023 6-Year Transportation Improvement Plan. Cole summarizes the Plan as presented. There is no public input. Mayor George closes the public hearing and re-opens the regular meeting at 7:13 p.m. Nysoe makes a motion; Broughton seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1311, adopting the City of Dayton 2018-2023 6-Year Transportation Improvement Plan. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

Chamber of Commerce – Berg reports on the success of Mule Mania and upcoming events. She stresses that volunteers are needed to assist with the various events and to contact the Chamber of Commerce if interested.

Commissioners – There is no report.

5. REPORTS OF CITY OFFICERS

Sheriff – There is no report.

Code Compliance – Atteberry reports the following: 1) 119 E. Commercial Street court-ordered abatement is complete; 2) Compliance focus is currently on dry grass and weeds.

Public Works – Costello reports the S. 1st Street Project will begin June 14. George reports that the Mustard Ditch Walking Bridge has been repaired to allow for ADA accessibility.

Planning Director – Scharer reports: 1) Friends of the Dog Park have the funding to begin installing the fence; 2) Will be presenting an ordinance at the June 26 meeting that will allow dogs to use and access the dog park via the Dayton City Park; and 3) Planning Commission continues work on the Comprehensive Plan and will be discussing the Complete Streets Program at their June 20 meeting.

City Clerk-Treasurer – Cole reports the W. Main Street Sidewalk Project is scheduled to begin the week of July 10.

Mayor Pro-Tempore – There is no report.

Mayor – George conveys that the City continues researching property options for locating mandatory upgrades to the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant that must be completed by 2021.

ACTION: Mayor George entertains a motion authorizing the staff's City Council's Discretionary Holiday be recognized on July 3, 2017. Nysoe makes a motion; Broughton seconds the motion authorizing July 3, 2017 as the City Council Discretionary Holiday. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

- ACTION: Nysoe makes a motion; Bailey seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1312, amending Resolution No. 1254, Section 3, Backhoe Interfund Loan Repayments. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.
- ACTION: Broughton makes a motion; Nysoe seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1313, amending the City Of Dayton Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual, Section 5.2 Regarding the Forms and Procedures for Disciplinary Action. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.
- ACTION: Berg makes a motion; Broughton seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1314, designating Dayton Chronicle as the City’s Official Newspaper of Legal Record for the Term June 14, 2017 through June 13, 2018 as Required by Law of Ordinances and Official Notices. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.
- ACTION: Bailey makes a motion; Nysoe seconds the motion to authorize Columbia County Sheriff’s Office request to use the Dayton City Park and Pool at no charge to hold the community-wide Annual National Night Out event on August 1, 2017. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

ORDINANCE NO. 1917

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
DAYTON, WASHINGTON, AMENDING CODIFIED DAYTON
MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 6-8.48 TO ALLOW DOGS IN
PIETRZYCKI (DAYTON) CITY PARK OFF-LEASH DOG PARK
AND ON-LEASH ALONG DESIGNATED PARK PATHS TO
REACH THE OFF-LEASH DOG PARK.

WHEREAS, the Dayton City Council adopted Ordinance 1438 on April 22, 1986 pertaining to animal control and the prohibition of dogs in city parks.

WHEREAS, the Park Element of the 2014 Dayton Comprehensive Plan Update identifies establishment of a dog park as one of the top three park priorities of stakeholders.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that the amendment allowing limited access by dogs in Pietrzycki (Dayton) City Park will benefit the City and residents of Dayton.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DAYTON, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Amendment to DMC Section 6-8.48. Dayton Municipal Code Section 6-8.48, Places Prohibited to Animals, is hereby amended as follows:

6-8.48. - Places prohibited to animals.

1. It shall be unlawful for any person to take or permit any animal, whether loose or on a leash or in arms, in or about any establishment or place of business where food or food products are sold or displayed, including but not limited to restaurants, grocery stores, meat markets, and fruit or vegetable stores.

2. It shall be unlawful for any person keeping, harboring ~~or, -having charge,~~ or control of any ~~dog and/or livestock to allow said~~ animals to be within the any city park ~~(excepting the dike)~~, the city cemetery, or the Dayton Public School grounds without the prior approval of the owners of the above mentioned properties. except as follows:

- a. Levee Path. Dogs on-leash, and livestock as defined in DMC 11-01.050 are allowed along the Levee Path.
- b. Pietrzycki (Dayton) City Park. Dogs are allowed on-leash within Pietrzycki City Park when accessing the off-leash dog park along the:
 - i. Park access path off S. 2nd St. and School Bus Lane south to and from the off-leash dog park entrance; and
 - ii. Park access path between the off-leash dog park (south) and Juvenile Fish Pond (north) to and from the off-leash dog park entrance.
- c. Pietrzycki (Dayton) City Park Off-Leash Dog Park. Dogs are allowed off-leash within Pietrzycki City Park Off-Leash Dog Park.

2-3. This section shall not apply to trained guide dogs and service animals provided for in section 6-8.32(2).

Section 2. Severability. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid for any reason, or should any portion of this ordinance be pre-empted by state or federal law or regulation, such decision or pre-emption shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and five days following its publication as required by law. The City-Clerk is directed to cause this Ordinance, or a summary hereof, to be published in the official newspaper of the City.
