1. CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Craig George calls the meeting to order at approximately 7:00 p.m.

ACTION: Bailey makes a motion; Berg seconds the motion, and the motion carries unanimously approving the Consent Agenda as presented:

3. SPECIAL GUESTS/PUBLIC COMMENT

ACTION:

Michael Smith, Dayton Historic Preservation Commission Chairman, summarizes the importance and history of Dr. Marcel & Mrs. Mary Pietryzcki's contributions to Dayton and the City Park. He reports that the Commission recommends replacing the existing park sign with a sign that includes the Pietryzcki name and phonetic spelling of his last name at no cost to the City. In addition, the Commission will work towards adding a monument to the Park in the Dr. & Mrs. Marcel Pietryzcki's honor. Broughton reports that the City Park Board supports the Commission's recommendation. Bailey asks if the Commission is requesting that the City to financially support the construction of the new sign. Smith responds no. Weatherford asks if the sign will be brought before Council for approval prior to its construction. Smith states yes, the Commission will present the sign for Council's approval prior to its construction. Smith also reports that the Commission will seek assistance from the Dayton School District for the construction of the sign. Broughton makes a motion; Paris seconds the motion accepting the Dayton Historic Preservation Commission's recommendation to replace the existing park sign with a Dayton City Park sign that includes the Pietryzcki name and phonetic spelling of his last name. Public Works – Costello reports the S. 1st Street Project will begin June 14. George reports that the Mustard Ditch Walking Bridge has been repaired to allow for ADA accessibility.

Planning Director – Scharer reports: 1) Friends of the Dog Park have the funding to begin installing the fence; 2) Will be presenting an ordinance at the June 26 meeting that will allow dogs to use and access the dog park via the Dayton City Park; and 3) Planning Commission continues work on the Comprehensive Plan and will be discussing the Complete Streets Program at their June 20 meeting.

City Clerk-Treasurer – Cole reports the W. Main Street Sidewalk Project is scheduled to begin the week of July 10.

Mayor Pro-Tempore – There is no report.

Mayor – George conveys that the City continues researching property options for locating mandatory upgrades to the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant that must be completed by 2021.

ACTION:

Mayor George entertains a motion authorizing the staff's City Council's Discretionary Holiday be recognized on July 3, 2017. Nysoe makes a motion; Broughton seconds the motion authorizing July 3, 2017 as the City Council Discretionary Holiday. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

George summarizes the issuance of water and sewer revenue bonds to fund various water and sewer projects. ACTION: Nysoe makes a motion; Bailey seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1312,

amending Resolution No. 1254, Section 3, Backhoe Interfund Loan Repayments. There

is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

ACTION: Broughton makes a motion; Nysoe seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No.

1313, amending the City Of Dayton Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual, Section

5.2 Regarding the Forms and Procedures for Disciplinary Action. There is no

discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

ACTION: Berg makes a motion; Broughton seconds the motion to authorize Resolution No. 1314,

designating Dayton Chronicle as the City's Official Newspaper of Legal Record for the Term June 14, 2017 through June 13, 2018 as Required by Law of Ordinances and

Official Notices. There is no discussion. The motion carries unanimously.

ACTION: Bailey makes a motion; Nysoe seconds the motion to authorize Columbia County

Sheriff's Office request to use the Dayton City Park and Pool at no charge to hold the community-wide Annual National Night Out event on August 1, 2017. There is no

discussion. The motion carries unanimously.
